You'll find something for almost every age and interest in <u>Let's Go, Renton!</u> our recreation guide for May through August.

<u>Registration is now open</u> for a limited number of classes, camps, and activities offered by our recreation division and partners. Registration for all offerings opens on April 26.

For the children, there are art classes, SAFE babysitting classes, fitness (from Hip Hop to gymnastics), and clinics in soccer, volleyball, softball, and flag football. In addition, there are week-long day camps at Highlands Neighborhood Center and Liberty Park and specialty camps at Renton Community Center.

Adaptive Recreation offerings include Trivia Nights, Club Nights, Carco Theatre Movie Nights, and three barrier-free hiking trips. In addition, there are two after-hours swim events at Henry Moses Aquatic Center, softball, pickleball, and fitness classes.

For adults, we offer women's self-defense, belly

dancing, fitness (dance, cardio, body sculpt), art, and sports leagues (coed softball, kickball).

Our seniors (50+) can enjoy day trips, luncheons, and events at the Don Persson Renton Senior Activity Center, dances (Line, Belly), and fitness classes at the senior center and our AARP Renton Fitlot exercise area at North Highlands Park.

<u>Course fee scholarships are available</u> for those 18 or younger, 50 and older, and Adaptive Recreation participants. This program is funded entirely through generous donations from individuals, service organizations, businesses, and grants.

The guide also contains information on a summer full of activities in the city: Renton River Days, concerts and movies in the park, Renton Farmers Market, and our annual Memorial Day and Juneteenth celebrations.

It's never too early to start making plans for summer, so please take a moment and look through *Let's Go*, *Renton!*

Pitch competition winners announced

Three contestants participating in the Main Street Entrepreneur Pitch competition won \$5,000 each to expand or start their businesses as winners in Tuesday night's live pitch session held at Renton Civic Theatre.

The winners were:

- Start-Up/Idea: Alisha Malcolm, owner, Dog N' Pony
- **Early:** Sarah Cabarteja, creator, Down The Ave LLC
- **Established:** Alina Muratova, owner, Sweet Nothings and More

An audience vote earned a \$1,000 People's Choice award for Mary Wu and her pitch for Coby's Café.

As an extra incentive, the category winners can earn an additional \$5,000 if they sign a business lease for a storefront downtown by October 15, 2023. In all, 19 businesses made three-minute pitches to a threeperson panel of judges.

The competition was made possible by grant funding from the <u>Port of Seattle's Economic Development</u> <u>Partnership Program</u> to the City of Renton. Hosted by Renton Downtown Partnership in collaboration with the City of Renton and sponsored by VAULT 89, Lane Powell, and Renton Civic Theatre; a total of 67 business owners and entrepreneurs competed over the course of two months.



545 households utilize Shred-a-thon

Renton Police Department's annual Shred-A-Thon, Prescription Drug Take Back & Food Drive last Saturday was a great success:

- 545 households participated.
- 13.5 tons of sensitive documents were shredded.
- 289.92 lbs. of prescription drugs were collected and safely disposed of.
- 1,434 lbs. of food and \$907 were collected and donated to the Salvation Army Food Bank.
