For the past 30-plus years, Robin Gregoris kept the Renton River Days parade humming like a finely tuned timepiece. Her calm demeanor and sense of humor allowed her to manage floats, dance troops, marching bands, fire trucks, police vehicles, grand marshals, elected officials, and the odd group of SeaFair clowns. Over the years, her work grew more significant as the parade grew in popularity. Her last year as parade coordinator was in 2022.

This year Robin has the honor of being Grand Marshal of the 2023 Renton River Days parade.

"I was shocked when they asked me," she said. "I think it shows how the city values the many River Days volunteers who work to make the event successful. I think I represent those volunteers."

"Robin exemplifies the profound River Days spirit," said Kelly Beymer, the city's Parks and Recreation Administrator. "Her willingness to roll up her sleeves and get involved has been an inspiration. She's very deserving of this honor."

Robin, born in Renton, became the parade coordinator because her employer, First Financial Northwest Bank, encouraged employees to give back to the community.

"Our president at the time, Mr. Harry Blencoe, wanted all of us, from upper management on down, to give back to the community if able," she explained.

"Each year there was something different," she says of her experience as parade coordinator. She smiles, "Like the 'street sweeper incident in 2019."

Each year volunteers chalk staging areas on Third Street along the curb early Saturday morning. Each area has a number that corresponds to a parade participant. Amid the morning's calm, the street sweeper decided to make one last pass to clean the street and, in the process, obliterated the chalk markings. Robin's response? She sprinted blocks to stop the street sweeper from preventing more damage.

We celebrate that level of dedication to the River Days festival this weekend.

"Where Community Grows" is this year's parade theme. It starts at 10 a.m. this Saturday and follows South Third Street from Shattuck Ave S to Liberty Park. Brotherton Cadillac and Brotherton GMC sponsor the parade.

Congratulations, Robin. Enjoy your ride at the front of the parade on Saturday. You've earned it.

# Renton River Days: The ultimate guide to the best summer festival




## Free festival shuttle:

Shape the future: Resident views matter in creating a resilient, livable, and accessible Renton

Contribute to Renton and the region's emergency preparedness and transportation solutions by voicing thoughts and opinions through several engagement opportunities.

## Recognizing Disability Pride Month and Renton School District National PTA Reflections Art Program winners

It was a packed room during Monday night's council meeting as various recognitions were acknowledged. The first is a proclamation designating July as <u>Disability Pride</u> <u>Month</u> in Renton.

Director of Communications & Public Affairs at <u>Kindering</u>, Kristina Brown, accepted the Disability Pride Month proclamation. Kindering is the largest not-for-profit neurodevelopment center in Washington with campuses in Bellevue, Bothell, Redmond, and Renton. They provide over 20 services, including early special education, individualized pediatric therapies, parent/caregiver support, and inclusive preschool for children with developmental delays, disabilities, and other needs. Disability Pride Month marks the anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), a landmark legislation signed on July 26, 1990, prohibiting discrimination against individuals with disabilities in all areas of public life.

Another way the city provides recreational opportunities and adaptive programs for people with disabilities is through our Parks and Recreation Department's Adaptive Recreation Program. The program has been providing youth and adults with disabilities the opportunity to participate in recreational activities and develop skills, selfconfidence, and a sense of community since the 1980s.

The second recognition honored two Renton School District students, <u>Summer Cameron</u> and <u>Elleanna Smith</u>, who were among 200 national finalists for the National Parent Teacher Association (PTA) Reflections Art Program.

Diane Cooper, Co-President of Nelson Middle School PTA, told the audience that every year the PTA holds the Reflections Art Contest, where 300,000 students nationally participate by submitting original works of art from literature, music, choreography, photography, & film following a unique theme.

This year's theme was "Show Your Voice." Summer won the Award of Merit for her film "In My Own Way," a story about living with cerebral palsy. Elleanna received the Award of Excellence for her dance, "Stand Up for the Weak."



# Text-to-911 now available in Washington State

As of June 2023, all counties and Public Safety Answering Points in Washington can now accept Text-to-911. All 911 centers in Washington have made the necessary changes to their call-handling equipment to receive and respond to requests for assistance via text messages.

This service expands opportunities for those who may not be able to place a call. The 911 rule of thumb is to call when possible to provide the most information to dispatch; however, text service enhances the ability to reach emergency services when voice calling is not available.

This service works as if texting a friend or family member. Open a text messaging program and enter 911 in the "To" field. Include the exact location of the emergency (including city) and the type of emergency help needed (police, fire, or medical). Then push "Send." Please do not include emojis, pictures, videos, or symbols in the message.
