Renton is susceptible to various degrees of natural emergencies, including earthquakes, flooding, snow, and extreme heat. September is Ready in Renton Month, the ideal time to prepare for upcoming severe weather. Here are a few ways to enhance or develop those emergency response skills.

### Take a class

The city's Emergency Management Division hosts a variety of classes through partnerships with Renton Technical College, Renton Regional Fire Authority, Renton Police Department, and others.

This fall, they host one of their most important classes: Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). These classes teach attendees how to prepare their homes for disasters and respond to neighborhood emergencies.

Topics include personal preparedness, first aid, fire suppression, search and rescue, terrorism response, and team organization. The CERT class meets every Thursday from 6 to 9 p.m. at Renton Regional Fire Authority Fire Station 14 starting September 21. The final drill is Saturday, November 4, from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Station 14. The class is free for ages 18 and older. Register online or in person at Renton Community Center.

Throughout the year, general preparedness classes are also available. Register for those online using the keyword "emergency."

Renton teens are invited to participate in the SAND Academy pilot program

The Safer Access to Neighborhood Destinations (SAND) invites Renton students in grades 8-12 to participate in the city's free SAND Academy at the Liberty Park Building. This in-person and interactive opportunity will allow students to work directly with city staff to determine safe routes for walking, biking, and getting around their neighborhood.

During the academy, students will receive a bicycle and pedestrian safety presentation and take a field trip to identify signal equipment and safety features on Renton's roadways. There are three dates available:

- Saturday, September 23, 2023: 10 a.m. –12 p.m.
- Saturday, September 30, 2023: 10 a.m. –12 p.m.
- Saturday, October 7, 2023: 10 a.m. 12 p.m.

Registration is free and students can receive up to two hours of high school community service credits. Student academy "cadets" will receive lunch and a free bike helmet (as supplies last).

The Washington State Traffic Safety Commission and City of Renton Public Works Department fund the SAND program. The program's primary goal is to reduce the number of pedestrian-involved accidents by educating and engaging young adults and aspiring drivers with tools and knowledge to empower safe and confident travel choices.



# WSDOT I-405 closures start Friday

Starting at 11:30 p.m. on Friday, September 8, through 4 a.m. on Monday, September 11, all lanes of I-405 will be closed from Coal Creek Parkway to Sunset Boulevard NE as part of the I-405 Renton to Bellevue Widening and Express Toll Lanes Project. Lane and ramp closures include:

- Sunset Boulevard NE on-ramp to northbound I-405
   All ramps at N 30th Street to I-405
- All ramps at NE 44th Street to I-405
- NE 44th Street over I-405
- All ramps at 112th Avenue SE/Lake Washington
- Boulevard SE (Exit 9) to I-405

  Coal Creek Parkway SE on-ramp to southbound I-
- 405

# Attend the year's last recycling event

Take advantage of the Solid Waste Utility division's final recycling event of 2023 on Saturday, September 9, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the Renton Technical College Parking Lot (NE 6th Place & Monroe Ave. NE). This event will collect Styrofoam and documents for shredding.

### Styrofoam Styrofoam peanuts and bubble wrap are accepted

- Clean white block Styrofoam (look for #6 or EPS
- inside the recycle symbol)

- Documents for shredding Up to five boxes (banker box size 12"x15"x10") or equivalent in bags are accepted
  - No need to remove staples, paperclips, or rubber bands
  - No binders, plastics, discs, ID badges, driver's licenses, cardboard, or hardcover books
  - Paper, blueprints, mail, photographs, and file folders are acceptable items for shredding

The city will also collect non-perishable food items for

distribution to Renton-area food banks. The city can refuse oversized vehicles or unacceptable materials/items. This event will not accept business waste. Vehicles will be allowed entry only from southbound Monroe Avenue NE. King County's waste reduction and recycling program provides funding for these events.
