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On Veterans Day, we want to thank all who have served and sacrificed for our country. Anytime you meet a veteran is an opportunity to honor their service.

Here at the city, we reached out to city staff who are veterans and asked them to send us a photo of their time in service. We then matched that photo with a current one and <u>produced a tribute video</u>.

The website <u>military.com</u> offers these eight ways that you can honor a veteran:

- 1. Attend a Veterans Day event to say "Thank You, Veterans" in person.
- Donate to veteran-focused charities: These wounded veteran charities have been impactful.
- 3. Fly a flag: military.com's guide to correctly flying the flag.
- 4. Ask about their service: This can help you appropriately thank them. Some questions to get started:

What did you do in the military?
How long did you serve?
What was your favorite moment in all your time in the service?
Did anyone else in your family serve?
Why did you go into the service branch you did?

Do not ask whether they've killed anyone. However, should your veteran be a combat vet unwilling to share or plainly state what they went through, be supportive without being intrusive. Sometimes you don't have to say anything; listen and give them your full attention.

- 5. Write a letter to say "thank you, veterans": If you don't know a veteran, look up the closest military installation and send your letter there. Small acts of recognizing someone's service, even anonymously, are appreciated. For example, the military-focused nonprofit <u>Soldiers' Angels</u> organizes volunteers to write letters to deployed troops, veterans, and their caregivers through their Letter Writing Virtual Team.
- 6. Don't confuse Veterans Day with Memorial Day: Veterans Day is a time to thank those who are serving or have served and are still with us.

 Memorial Day is to reflect and remember those who lost their lives in service to their country.
- 7. Visit a VA Hospital

Get outdoors with a veteran: Invite a veteran or a military family to explore a national park; admission is free for all visitors on Veterans Day.

Rainier/Grady plan wins Governor's Smart **Communities Smart Vision Award**

The city has won a ninth Governor's Smart Communities Smart Vision Award, this time for work to develop the Rainier/Grady Junction Transit-Oriented Subarea Plan.

The plan envisions a people-focused, mixed-use neighborhood around the future South Renton Transit Center. The center will be a transit hub for Sound Transit's expanded Bus Rapid Transit service in Renton and South King County.

"I'm pleased that the planning and hard work of our staff has been recognized with a Governor's Smart Community Award," said Mayor Armondo Pavone. "Their plan successfully articulates a shared vision for our community and serves as a blueprint for other communities.

"The future transit center and introduction of Bus Rapid Transit service to Renton are significant investments to address the ever-growing transportation needs of our residents."

As part of the plan, the Washington State Department of Commerce awarded the city a competitive grant for \$250,000 to complete a planned action ordinance and Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). When complete, this work allows for a more streamlined and predictable environmental review process for project proposals within the EIS boundary. As a result, future development will effectively use public and private investment to build a mix of pedestrian-friendly residential housing, commercial space, office space, and open space built around the transit center.

The Governor's Smart Communities Awards recognize achievements by local governments and their partners. These programs promote thoughtful growth planning and projects that contribute to thriving communities, a prosperous economy, and sustainable infrastructure. The state department of commerce administers the awards and named eight cities 2022 Smart Communities Award winners.

Councilmember Alberson elected to RFA

Renton City Councilmember James Alberson, Jr. was unanimously elected by his fellow councilmembers Monday night to a threeyear term on the Renton Regional Fire Authority (RFA) Governance Board.

His term will begin in January 2023.

The governance board is responsible for approving the annual RFA budget. It is comprised of three city council members and three Fire District 25 Commissioners. There is also one non-voting member representing King County Fire District 40, which contracts for services from the RFA.

Mr. Alberson is in his first term on the Renton City Council, winning election in 2021. He chairs the Utilities Committee, is vice chair of the Planning & Development Committee, and is a member of Community Services Committee

He is a 25-year resident of Renton and served eight years on the Renton Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, in addition to chairing the board for three years. Before being elected to the city council, he served as a planning commissioner for the city for two years.

He also serves on the Puget Sound Regional Council Executive Board, South County Area Transportation Board, Eastside Transportation Partnership, King County Parks and Trails Coalition, and Lodging Tax Advisory Committee.

Protect your pet with free microchipping

Nothing is more frightening for owners of dogs and cats than when they go missing.

Renton residents can increase their odds of getting their pets home by taking advantage of a free microchipping program via Renton's Unleashed Furry Friends (RUFF) Fund through the Renton Regional Community Foundation.

Microchipping inserts a tiny chip into your pet. It's a quick, safe, and simple procedure. The chip can be scanned to access your information and reunite you and your lost dog or cat.

Chipping is available Mondays-Fridays at **Eastside** Veterinary Associates, 1700 NE 44th St., Renton, 98056. Check-in is 11:30 a.m. No appointment is necessary. Proof of Renton residency via a driver's license or utility bill is required at the time of service.



Share your skills on a city committee or commission

Serving on one of the city's committees and commissions is an excellent way for Renton residents to share their skills and experiences to help shape policies that affect our community.
